2009 Free Agency Review

Here is my review of the 2009 Free Agency period. All dollar values listed are the per year values of the contract. Big Fish is defined as signings greater than or equal to \$3,000,000 per year. Dumpster diving is defined as signings for less than \$500,000 per year. Middle class is everything else. Please take my evaluations with a grain of salt, as I'm doing this more for entertainment than serious prognostication.

Alaska Hot Stoves

Big Fish: none Middle Class: none

Dumpster Diving: Tony Abreu (2 yrs @ \$250,000), Pat Burrell (3 yrs @ \$420,000), Bruce Chen (1 yr @ \$237,000), Ian Kennedy (3 yrs @ \$355,000),

Kazuo Matsui (2 yrs @ \$375,000), Augie Ojeda (2 yrs @ \$250,000)

Review: Alaska chose to look for some bargains and filler, as there was not a lot of money in the bank. Pat Burrell's contract could work out nicely if he rebounds from an off year and I think the flyer on Ian Kennedy could pay off as well in year 3.

Annadale Anteaters

Review: Annadale didn't have much cash in the bank, so they picked up some

cheap playing time on minimum or near minimum contracts.

Review: Despite having a little bit of money to spend, Aspen chose to focus on value signings with potential upside, as evident by the contracts to Vernon Wells and Laynce Nix. Jacobs and Kotchman form a cheap solution to a big hole at first base. Wheeler was a good value signing even with his card being hard right.

Bloomington Greeks

Dumpster Diving: none

Review: Bloomington shelled out big bucks for Kevin Correia, which is a bit surprising since his previous high in innings was 110. Correia will have to keep producing like he did in 2009 to make this contract worthwhile. Brandon Lyon doesn't figure to have a very good closer rating (only 3 for 6 in 2009), but his recent form (excluding 2008) and balanced card make the dollar value worth it. The Nick Masset signing perplexes me. 2009 was the first year he gave up less than one hit per inning and came anywhere close to a 9 K/9. I hope Vaughn knows something I don't about Masset or else this contract may come back to bite him.

Review: The big splash was signing Bengie Molina, possibly the slowest player in the game. He can still hit the ball out of the ballpark, though, so he has worth. The rest of the signings were to provide innings for the pitching staff. If Oliver Perez ever straightens his head out, his signing could be a steal. Don't count on it, however.

Review: Mike Forsyth comes back into BRASSWORLD and tries to sign every third baseman available! Well, he missed on Adrian Beltre, but you get the point. I imagine Garrett Atkins will get some time at first base, so there won't be a three-headed monster at third. There were some interesting gambles too in Wang, Nady, Neshek and Robertson. I like the gambles on Wang and Nady, as they could come back and be part of the Yankee machine in the near future. I'm not so sold on Neshek and Robertson, however. Neshek hasn't really pitched in two years and I'm sure many Tiger fans wish Robertson hadn't pitched the last two years either. However, both came cheap so it's worth the gamble.

Gotham City Gargoyles

Review: Gotham City was able to resign Mariano Rivera, but it used a big portion of their available cash and forced them to shop on the cheap for their remaining signings. Of those, I like the Kelly Johnson signing the best. He had a down year last year, but only in terms of batting average. He still showed power and patience, so he is a good bet to rebound and reap huge dividends for the Gargoyles.

Review: Greenville shelled out some cash to pick up five starting players. Derek Lowe and Brad Penny had down years, but if they return to form the contracts given to them will be good value. If Michael Young was still at shortstop I would like the contract more, but I fear his bat won't carry at third base for the life of the contract.

Review: Hoboken shelled out some big bucks to land two-fifths of a rotation. I think Pete was very surprised there were no bids on Doug Davis, and decided to spread the money over three years rather than give him a one year deal for five megabucks. David Ortiz and Alfonso Soriano are signings to keep an eye on for the long term. Both had down years in 2009, but if they rebound these contracts will be considered very cheap.

The pitchers signed could pan out, but all have troubled recent history as well. Lots of risk, only time will tell how much reward.

Review: I think the Adrian Beltre contract is the absolute steal of this free agency period. Jonah is going to be very happy with that contract for years to come. The gambles on Gil Meche and Ben Sheets could pay off very big as well and the dollar amounts are reasonable. DeRosa provides a nice utility bat to help plug holes as the rebuilding continues and the rest of the contracts are very reasonable as filler. Chris Snyder is a little bit of a gamble (back surgery, eek!), but cheap. The only signing I didn't like is Jeff Clement. The Pirates are going to have him play first base and his bat is nothing special there. Unless he returns to catcher he has no value.

Rumor has it that David Dick will be wearing his Ichiro jersey for every single Strat session over the life of the contract. The de la Rosa signing could blow up (he does pitch in Coors!). The Kenshin Kawakami contract is a great value, especially when compared to the contracts signed by Brad Penny and Jeff Suppan. The Hawkins deal is also good value compared to some of the other contracts for relievers with closer ratings. Vizquel was a bit of an overpay for a platoon partner with Stephen Drew. The Shawn Marcum signing was a bit of a gamble, but if he returns to form it will pay off in spades. The rest of the signings were to address some holes and were relatively cheap.

Certainly the most money went to Joe Nathan and considering what other relievers went for in this period he was certainly the reliever steal of free agency and I think the second best signing behind Montreal's signing of Adrian Beltre. The rest of the signings are an interesting mix and are all helpful cards for 2010.

I don't think this is a knock against Matt as much as the fact that with an auction-style free agency it is entirely possible for an owner to just miss on enough guys that they get forced into overpaying for options B and C. Luckily (or perhaps unluckily for the rest of us), Waikiki still has the most cash in the bank of any franchise and I'm sure that once the young kids like Feliz, Tillman, Posey and Schafer start producing Matt is going to make some big splashes in free agency and turn Waikiki into a powerhouse.

Review: To use terminology from Michael Lewis' book Liars Poker, Williamsburg is the "Big Swinging Dick" this year, shelling out almost \$35M just in 2010 salaries. Top dog indeed! I think the Pujols contract is actually very good value, considering that his contract is cheaper than CC Sabathia, Johan Santana or ARod. Counsell ended up being a bit of overpay due to auction fever, but at least it is only for one year. Adam Dunn will probably live up to the value of that contract, as the folks in BRASSWORLD see more (and true) value in him than MLB GMs. I'm sure after this cash outlay anything short of title contention will be a disappointment in Williamsburg.

Building On The LaFontaine Legacy - A Lefty Makeover

When Mark asked me to join BW there were 2 immediate pluses that I saw:

- 1) The LaFontaine team built by Dan had an outstanding core
- 2) The ability to build custom parks is a huge draw for me in any league I'm joining

Having played with Dan in BRASS & BLOC the last two years, it didn't surprise me to see a really good foundation:

- Felix H, Josh Johnson, Shields & Dice-K as key SPs
- Aardsma & Affeldt anchoring the pen
- Zobrist, Ethier, Damon & Aramis Ramirez as the cornerstones on offense
- Some nice young talent in Billy Butler, Martin Prado, Sean West, and a good prospect list including Smoak, T Beckham & A Crow

Plenty to work with there, and enough LH/SW talent on offense for me to build my typical lefty-slanted park with some hope that I'd be able to cobble together the 3-4 more LH bats & 2 LH Ps I'd need to make it functional. In the

end, allowing for some weather effects, we went for a park that is 18 BP HR to LH and 1 to RH during normal conditions.

The biggest issue confronting this team was money. After initially confusing "bank balance" with "carryover" (sorry Corey!), I realized the 1st deal I had made with Jonah (basically Smoak, Dice-K & Quentin for Bedard, Davis & change) had left me nearly penniless. So I had three priorities seemingly competing against each other:

- Finish finding the LH talent I needed after acquiring a few pieces in the deal with Jonah
- Solidifying SS as I didn't think Zobrist would have good enough D there
- Slashing costs enough to build a bankroll of \$4-5M heading into free agency

I scouted a few teams and after a while found one with the kind of SSs I wanted: 2 range D, fully eligible for playoffs, OB .360 or better vs RH. Rene of Aspen needed some pitching and liked Shields, and I liked Bartlett. He cost me a 1st round pick as well but I figured in the end it'd be worth it given he has 3 years of control left at below-market pricing. I also shaved payroll in the deal so killed two birds with one stone.

As free agency progressed we continued to add & subtract according to plan. Since the makeover started, here's the tally sheet:

Departed:

SPs: Dice-K, Shields

Hitters: Quentin, Prado, Alexei Ramirez Prospects: Smoak, Crow, Montero, Melville

Come & Gone:

Valbuena, Nick Hundley

Added:

SPs: Bedard, Sowers, Karstens

Hitters: Chris Davis, Bartlett, John Baker, Schierholtz, Venable

RPs: Joe Nathan

Prospects: Hosmer, Arrieta

With about \$4M left in the bank and just a couple of very small holes to fill, thinking we can make minor splashes the rest of FA & prep for the draft with 5 or 6 picks in the 1st 3 rounds to work with. Here's what the lineup vs RH looks like at this point:

SS Bartlett LF Damon

- RF Ethier
- 2B Zobrist
- 1B Davis
- CF Venable
- 3B Ramirez
- C Baker

SPs are King Felix, J Johnson, Bedard/Sowers, Karstens, West RPs are J Nathan, Aardsma, Affeldt, R Ramirez & Nunez

So we're feeling good about going into battle with that group, should be a blast, so many thanks for the invite.

A couple more quick notes about BW - I like the deep prospect list, though I am curious to see what impact it has on the depth of the draft compared to other leagues. Also, while the auction format is quite lively, I do think that the end prices are not stratospheric for anyone, so I feel like the money at play is relatively evenly distributed and the market for talent is a relatively mature one. That should bode well for parity/competitiveness in the league overall.


